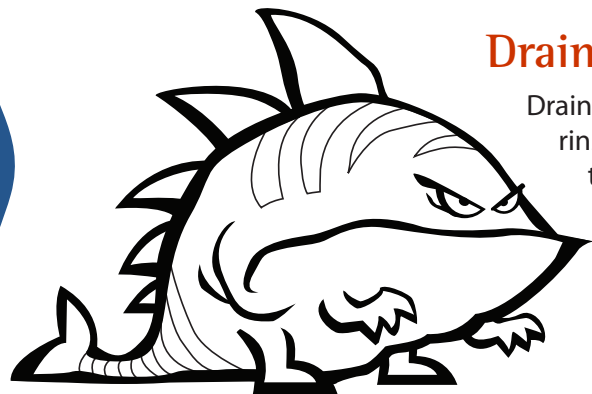


Color These Water Wasters—But Don't Be One!

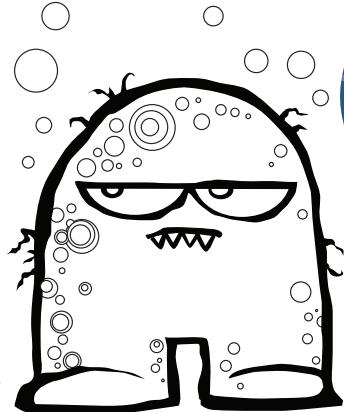
Drainiac

Answer Key for Test Your WaterSense

1. Answer: D. It may seem hard to believe, but the average person uses 100 gallons of water per day, so a family uses about 400 gallons each day. If 100 gallons is enough to fill 1,600 drinking glasses, imagine how many glasses a whole family would fill up.
2. Answer: C. Help your parents test your toilets for leaks. Place a drop of food coloring in the tank and if the color shows in the bowl before flushing, you have a leak.
3. Answer: C. Leaky faucets are big water wasters. If you see or hear a leaky faucet, tell your parents about it so they can get it fixed.
4. Answer: A. If a house has leaks that waste 200 gallons each week, that's 10,400 gallons of water wasted each year—enough to fill a backyard swimming pool.

5 to 7 correct = You're a water wonder. You barely let a drip get by you.

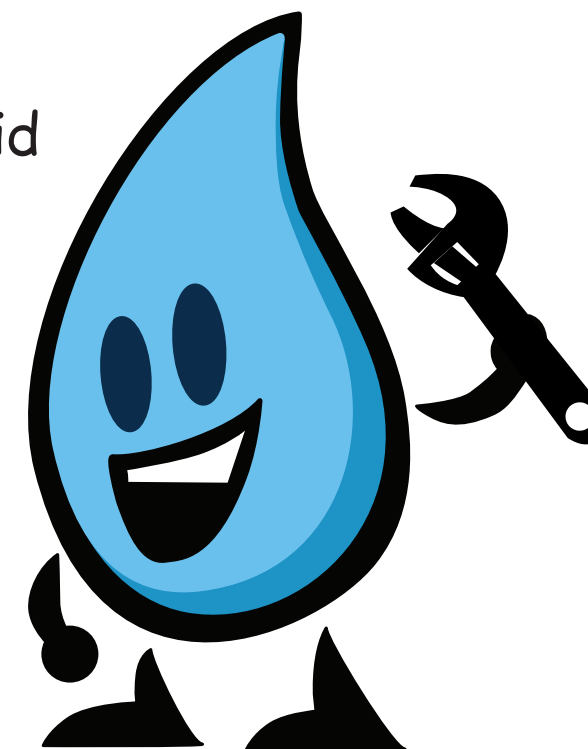
0 to 4 correct = Good job. Keep working on your water sense to get even better.

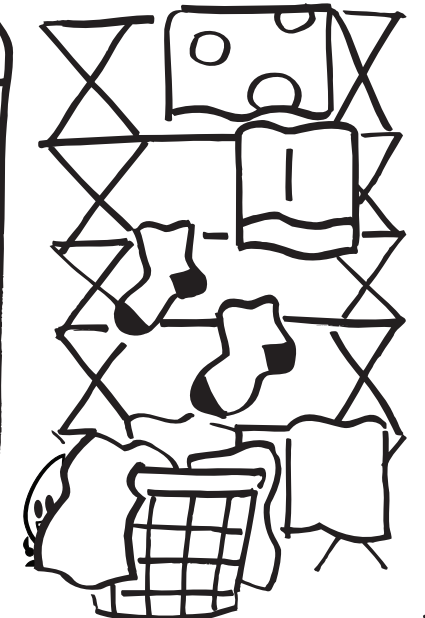
