Claims of the Navajo Nation

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States provides these reports and this information to support its good-faith basis for the water rights claims made on behalf the Navajo Nation. Further, the United States discloses the names and addresses of those individuals who authored the reports and those who participated in preparing or providing information for the reports.

#### I. Introduction

This general stream adjudication was initiated nearly four decades ago when the State of New Mexico filed this lawsuit to identify and quantify all water rights associated with the surface and ground waters of the San Juan River Basin in New Mexico. *See Complaint* of the State of New Mexico (March 13, 1975). Shortly after the suit was initiated, the United States, acting as trustee on behalf of the Navajo Nation, asserted claims to water rights on behalf of the Navajo Nation. *See Answer* of the United States (July 7, 1975) and *Supplemental Answer* of the United States (January 12, 1976). Soon after the United States asserted rights on behalf of the Navajo Nation, the Navajo Nation intervened in this adjudication to pursue, protect, and quantify its water rights in the basin. *See Order* (December 14, 1977) (granting the Navajo Nation's request to intervene).

Since 1975, the United States and the Navajo Nation have taken those steps necessary to litigate the Navajo Nation's water rights. In 1997, to avoid further, protracted litigation and to resolve the water rights of the Navajo Nation, the State of New Mexico, the Navajo Nation, and the United States began settlement negotiations. Over the next 8 years, the Settling Parties engaged in good-faith negotiations to resolve the water rights of the Navajo Nation. On April 19, 2005 the State of New Mexico and the Navajo Nation resolved the dispute concerning Navajo Nation water rights and entered into a settlement agreement concerning those rights. Subsequently, over the next four years the Navajo Nation, the State of New Mexico, and the United States were engaged with Congressional and Executive branch representatives to secure authorization for the settlement agreement through federal legislation. After public hearings in the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate, Congressional authorization was secured on March 25, 2009. On March 30, 2009, the President of the United States signed Public Law 111-11 that authorized the United States to enter into the settlement with the Navajo Nation and the State. After conforming the original settlement agreement to the provisions of Public Law 111-11, the Secretary of the Interior signed the Navajo Settlement Agreement on December 17, 2010 (hereafter referred to as the "Settlement Agreement"), and, as such, the United States became a settling party along with the Navajo Nation and the State of New Mexico (hereafter the three parties will be referred to collectively as "Settling Parties"). Today, after thirty-seven years of litigation including more than a decade of settlement negotiation activity, the water rights of the Navajo Nation in the San Juan River basin in New Mexico have been settled between the State of New Mexico, the United States, and the Navajo Nation.

In 2009, the Settling Parties returned to this Court and informed it that the Settling Parties had secured a settlement agreement. The Settling Parties informed the Court that the Settlement Agreement contemplated the entry of two proposed partial final decrees: 1) the Partial Final Decree that primarily addressed the water rights associated with the main stem waters of the San Juan River and 2) the Supplement Partial Final Decree that primarily addressed the water rights associated with ephemeral, tributary streams spread throughout the basin. In 2010, in anticipation of evaluating the provisions of the Settlement Agreement this Court instructed the United States to quickly prepare a more detailed statement of claims. *See Order Establishing Initial Procedures for Entry of a Partial Final Judgment and Decree of the Water Rights of the* 

*Navajo Nation* (August 19, 2010) at 11-12, § II.B.2. The stated purpose for the United States preparing and filing a more detailed statement of claims to "[t]o assist the Court and other water rights claimants in evaluating the settlement ....." *See id.* 11, § II.B.

In response to this Court's order, the United States quickly marshaled its resources to prepare a more detailed statement of claims of the Navajo Nation's water rights.<sup>1</sup> On January 3, 2010, the United States filed its statement of claims on behalf of the Navajo Nation in which it described those claims that the United States, acting as trustee for the Navajo Nation, would pursue in this adjudication in the event that the Settlement Agreement failed for any reason. The United States has fully complied with the Court's order of August 19, 2010.

In the U.S. Statement of Claims, the United States described, in detail, the water rights of the Navajo Nation based on the federal reserved water rights doctrine and the aboriginal use and occupancy of the lands by the Navajo Nation. *See* U.S. Statement of Claims § II.A. Fundamentally, the United States claimed sufficient water to provide for the present and future water needs of the Navajo Nation necessary to ensure that lands held in trust by the United States on behalf of the Navajo Nation ("Navajo trust lands) were a permanent home and abiding place for the Navajo Nation. *See id.* at § II.A. Generally, the U.S. Statement of Claims described the following categories of water rights claims for Navajo trust lands:

- 1. domestic, commercial, municipal, and industrial water rights, see id. at § III.A;
- 2. heavy industrial water rights, see id. at § III.B;
- 3. livestock water rights, see id. at § III.C;

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> As recognized by the Court, in the event that the Court does not enter the proposed settlement decrees, the United States specifically retains the right to further amend its Statement of Claims. See id. at 14, § II.B.3. The United States' right to amend includes the right to identify additional bases for water rights and to claim greater quantities of water associated with identified water rights. The U.S. Statement of Claims was the most reasonable estimate of the water rights that might be asserted on behalf of the Navajo Nation that could be generated in the short timeframe within which the United States was asked to respond to the Court's order.

- 4. irrigation water rights for lands presently or historically irrigated, see id. at § III.D;
- irrigation water rights for lands to be irrigated in the future, see id. at § III.E and §
  III.F;
- 6. rights concerning existing and future impoundment water rights, see id. at § III.G; and
- 7. rights concerning existing wells and springs and future wells, see id. at § III.H.

Subsequent to filing the U.S. Statement of Claims, the United States described that in advance of any obligation imposed by this Court, it would voluntarily provide all parties those reports that support the technical basis for the water rights claims. *See Settling Parties' Proposal For Scheduling Order* (September 22, 2011) at 2. As the United States has previously described, the purpose for providing these reports is "to provide all parties with a complete ability 'to evaluate the merits of the settlement' and to support the good faith basis for its statement of claims." *Id.* (quoting *Order Establishing Initial Procedures for Entry of a Partial Final Judgment and Decree of the Water Rights of the Navajo Nation* (August 19, 2010) at 11, § II.B).<sup>2</sup>

# II. Technical Reports Supporting Claims Made in the U.S. Statement of Claims

The U.S. Statement of Claims described water right claims under several categories. For each water right claimed, the report (or reports) supporting the technical basis for that claim is described in the paragraphs below. Further, the United States identifies the authors of the reports, those persons who assisted with preparing any report, those persons who performed analysis for any report, and those persons who gathered information for any report.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Some parties in this adjudication have described (expressly or impliedly) that in the Navajo *Inter Se* the Settling Parties must somehow *prove* either the water rights described in the Settlement Agreement that were the result of negotiation and compromise, or the water rights described in the U.S. Statement of Claims (or both). *See e.g. San Juan Water Commission's Supplemental Brief on the Appropriate Legal Standard to be Applied to the Navajo Inter Se Proceeding* (January 2, 2012). The United States recognizes that in the Navajo *Inter Se* it is an appropriate exercise for the Court to compare the Settlement Agreement as a whole to the potential claims of the Navajo Nation to determine whether the Settlement Agreement is fair and reasonable. *See Settling Parties Supplemental Brief* (January 3, 2012). The U.S. claims are, by their very nature, the claims by which the Court can make a comparison to determine whether the Settlement Agreement is fair and reasonable. Neither the Court nor any party needs more information to perform this comparison.
